The three new committee members, Margaret, Pera and Brian were welcomed to the committee by Steve.



7. Steve Linaker thanked the three outgoing TAA Committee members. Les Simpson, Peter Starr and Wayne Hanley for their service to Traditional Archery in Australia. Peter for the excellent work as treasurer for the past twelve months. Wayne for his outstanding work in managing the TAA Website for the past six years. However for Les there was a special presentation of a gift from all TAA Committee Members, Life Members, TAA Representatives and TAA members. Les was there with Ian Fenton at the commencement of TAA in 2005. From 2005 to the present day he has always served in an office bearer position. Les will continue to promote and protect the sport that he loves he is just retiring from the committee.

#### **New Business**

1. TAA Club Representatives present are each asked by Steve to give a short report on the progress of their club.

<u>South Coast Archers</u>- Glenn McMahon NSW. This club is not traveling too well. The inability of the club to find suitable grounds, coupled with the ill health of members, may see this club fold by the end of the year. The club has been running five years and without younger members volunteering to step up to help do the work the club will close.

<u>Wammenusking</u>- Noel Stone WA. This club has gone from strength to strength. There is lots of enthusiasm from members particularly the new members. Noel is moving a couple of hours drive south of the club, Andrew Szczecinski will be the new TAA Club Rep. This year they held a very successful WA State Titles.

<u>Southern Forests Archers</u>- Stephen Croft WA. On a bit of a rocky bridge at the moment with member numbers but they are not looking at closing. They have an Interclub Shoot coming up and they are still building the club. There has been a leadership change, Nicole Booth is now the new Club President.

<u>Coffs Coast Archers</u>- Simon Radford NSW. The club is very satisfied with how things are going for them. They held the Inaugural NSW State Titles this year along with other Interclub Shoots. The next two day shoot is next weekend.

<u>Chinchilla Archers</u>- Glen Mason QLD. The club is going okay, they have just held their first big Interclub Shoot. 48 Nominations and everyone had a ball. They are keen to run a bigger shoot. Glen thanked Dave McGuire for all the help he gave them at the recent shoot.

<u>Loxley Archers</u>- Peter Starr TAS. All three TAA Tasmanian Clubs are doing well. They are looking forward to Castle Bay's shoot in November. Beginner's courses have begun and are running all over the state. Disability groups are also being introduced to traditional archery.



<u>Tully Bowhunters</u>- Brian Ross *Rossy* QLD. The club is looking good. The members are having yarns about recruitment. Present club needs new faces to fill the stable, particularly younger members to assist the more mature current committee members. The grounds are secure into the future.

<u>North Burnett Field Archers</u>- Pauleen Dakin QLD. The club has held a very productive two day traditional shoot this year. They are still plugging along with a very proactive group of ten foundation members.

Bega Valley Archers- Venke Mannes NSW. A very quiet year due to lockdowns. The club is starting up again next Saturday.

<u>Ascension</u>- Arman Haque VIC. They have just had their first week of freedom from the very extensive Melbourne lockdowns. It was very exciting to see members returning. They have just acquired one new horse and now have seven. They also have two camels that need to mature a bit more before they can be ridden. The club is very happy with their planned introductory courses/come and try days. The grounds have become a bit overgrown during lockdown and need some attention. There were many online videos for members during lockdown.

<u>Rockingham Traditional Archers</u>- Vic Smith WA. The club has had a good year. They have 60 members. There is still some growth potential. The club bank balance is healthy. The club is very active, however they are up to finding their fourth grounds and are currently pursuing this with the council.

<u>South West Bowmen</u>- Bonnie Cabrini WA. The TAA National Muster has been put on hold due to border closures as only WA members could attend. This event is now calendared for May 2022, this will follow the April Masters games. The club have just held a very successful Interclub Shoot with 59 shooters. The novelties and target placement were an eye opener for some visitors.

### 2. TAA Development Fund Grant Scheme announcement.

Steve Linaker announced the first release of funds from the TAA Development Fund. The money in this fund comes from the ten dollars contributed by each adult archer at Title Shoots. The fund may sometimes have money enter from sale of assets, donations and extra raffle takings. An explanation of the fund is included in the introduction on the Grant Submission Form. Les Simpson explained that this fund is TAA's way of giving back to members to help them support and promote traditional archery. Submissions may include the purchase of equipment to help run a program, encourage club growth and/or meet safety audit requirements. Equipment for running traditional archery craft skills would also be considered. The form will be sent to all Club Representatives straight after the AGM. The last day for submission being the 1st December 2021.



#### 3. Purpose of the TAA Raffles explained.

Greg Smith was the driving force in running a very successful club raffle in 2021. The money raised being for promotion of TAA through merchandise that carries the TAA logo. Each club has been given a voucher from the raffle money. The voucher is to be used to buy TAA merchandise that will help each club advertise Traditional Archery in Australia. This has been an excellent team effort by clubs and a great way to bring people together. TAA will try and continue the raffles.

### 4. Shoot and Equipment Guideline Changes.

Perry Jackson explained that guidelines were difficult to write as people often have different interpretations. Minor changes have been made to the guidelines to try and streamline and simplify the wording so that it is concise and easy to understand. The following changes have been made.

<u>Shoot Guidelines</u>: Hunt Round to be a horseshow shape to accommodate both right and left handed people. No archer is to walk the course before shooting. An adult helping a cub must have first shot the course.

Equipment Guidelines: The length for a longbow has been removed.

#### 5. The announcement of the 2022 National and State Muster venues.

- The postponed 2020 National Muster will be held in May at the South West Bowmen Club. The actual date will be announced soon.
- The 2022 NSW State Muster will be held at Coffs Coast Archery Club 18<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> June.
- The 2022 Qld State Muster are in talks and will be announced as soon as they are finalised.
- The 2022 National Muster are in talks and will be announced as soon as they are finalised.
- There has been no conversation started as yet for the 2022 WA State Muster.

Steve Linaker moved that the Coffs Coast venue be supported as suitable and asked for a show of hands. All present agreed. Steve thanked Simon from Coffs Coast.

Steve Linaker asked if there are any other items up for discussion.

6. TAA Member James Murray, now of the Tuggeranong Archery Club an AA club in the ACT, has asked if he can organise TAA events at the club. James sent in an email prior to the AGM. James has indicated in the email that the Club President is all in favour. James has asked for expressions of interest from TAA members via Facebook



this month. There seems to be a strong interest in both an Asian event and a field/clout event that he is proposing for 2022.

TAA told James prior to the AGM that we can help advertise the events.

The Committee have agreed to discuss this further at the next Committee Meeting.


There were no more items put forward for discussion.

Have fun, protect, and teach the young archers and champion archers of tomorrow. Without the kids we have no future.


They say build it and they will come, we have built a bloody good thing for Traditional Archers, protect and develop it and above all keep it trad!

### TAA Treasurer Peter Starr Report 2021

#### Hi all

I came on board as the treasurer on 1<sup>st</sup> July 2020. Our current financial situation is strong with a healthy bank balance of just over \$19,000. This is largely due to the increase in membership fees.

The TAA development fund has a balance of \$2,721.

Insurance rose by nearly \$2,000 last year. It will probably rise again next year as insurers are getting harder to find. I would budget for around \$7,000 that is if all Associations remain in the group. If ABA pull out as they threatened to do last year insurance could rise to around \$10,000.

The merchandise account is moving along nicely and showed sales of \$2,996 and purchases of \$2,135+(2,400 Stock on hand 1/1/2021). There is still some carry over merchandise stock from previous years currently being sold.

I created a system (TAA Excel Cashbook) that includes Income /payments / asset register / petty cash register (supplied by Beth) / treasurer receipt and invoice register and merchandise receipt book and several ledgers. I believe this will take TAA into the future.


Unfortunately, there was an issue with the merchandise receipt book, and I had to cancel receipt numbers 25 to 40.

When each email arrives it is my job to direct the correspondence to the committee member with an expertise in the required area. The most in-depth answers usually come from Perry as he diligently explains anything and everything related to bow making and other archery related crafts and skills. Some enquiries lead to wonderful outcomes, such as the start of a new TAA club or the discovery of a member with amazing craft skills.

While most correspondence has taken place using e-technology I have also this year corresponded with several members using good old fashioned letters and stamps. TAA members who do not have access to email can still communicate with us using phone calls and post. It just takes a little longer.

It has also been my pleasure this year to help Greg, our TAA Club Coordinator, organise the Zoom meetings for our TAA clubs. These take place when needed usually every two months



- All membership renewals and applications now receive a merchandise flyer and where possible an up-to-date event calendar.




Following are graphs illustrating TAA membership demographics




The above in words based on current membership (15 August 2021)



### TAA Risk and Safety Officer and TAA Hunt Advisor Reports Paul Sparkes 2021

### TAA Safety and Ethics Report

Covid has definitely put a dampener on being able to attend as many shoots as I would have liked, I still have many clubs to visit to get amongst their Shoots and Club Activities. Attending different clubs has enabled me to gain a more in-depth and better understanding of current and potential issues regarding the integrity of our Safety and Ethics.

### Safety

A point-of-emphasis for this year has been Insurance and our Compliance in accordance with the Insurance Company's Policy requirements. As a result of this, a review and revision of the Safety Audit has been completed. We request this report annually from our TAA Clubs prior to renewal.

We have made several additions to the Audit to ensure safety requirements are being met. A few of the Key-Points Include:

- All Coaches must possess their state's Working With Children Clearance, such as the Qld Blue Card, to Instruct Children.
- Ensure All Clubs have Members qualified to Coach (TAA Accredited).
- All forms are filled out accurately and truthfully as they are Legally Binding.

Compliance on these is critical to ensure each TAA club is of an acceptable standard and not left liable in the event of an Accident, Injury etc. If these are not filled out accurately the Insurance may not choose to cover your policy. If you have any questions or queries, please do not hesitate to reach out as it's in everyone's best interest to get this sorted swiftly.

In addition to this, would clubs please ensure that your courses/ranges are checked and deemed compliant by your Designated Safety Officers prior to commencing a shoot as per your Declared Safety Audit Form.

Our Organisation has poured a lot of time and resources into securing the best insurance deals and pass them down to your TAA Club, so please act in everyone's best interest.



### **Ethics**

On the Ethics front, there aren't many Ethical Issues to highlight or Raise. I feel like as a whole the TAA Network do a great job of spreading Positivity through Archery. I feel this could be enhanced through Education to our present & future members around Traditional Archery, its history and Core Values.

The following subjects would look like this:

- Educate & Promote Traditional Archery, through its evolution and what it still offers over modern means of Archery and Hunting.
- To Actively Recognise and Educate on the Craftsmanship, Skills and Techniques. Inspiring Confidence to all levels through a more in-depth knowledge and understanding of the Art.
- A more proactive approach to promoting Official TAA News, Activities and Shoots. With an emphasis on encouraging new and inexperienced archers to jump in on the fun. This could come in the way of webinars, online training, marketing, etc.

Our Core values are what sets us apart as Traditional Archers and have allowed us to be successful. Many other Archery Organisations are now envious of this success. Many clubs are looking to join our association based on the value we bring in the way of reduced Membership fees and Insurance prices. This is a tremendous position to be in, but I am concerned that some of these clubs are looking to join TAA for this reason primarily and TAA's Core Values secondary.

We have a great product that has been built on Preserving and Promoting the Art of Traditional Archery. I would hate to see this bastardised by individuals and clubs who do not share our Vision and are only invested for the financial benefits. We have current examples of this already in our organisation that have made it no secret that we were their choice purely for the financial benefits.

My proposal for the future is a more in-depth inquiry when looking to bring on new clubs. Attendance at shoots and a committee vote before bringing these clubs on board. A requirement of traditional bows, recurves/longbows, to be available for Beginner Archers as Club bows. These should be the available bows for all beginners in order to establish Traditional Archery as their Primary Discipline.

Compounds I believe still play a major role in the growth of Traditional Archery as I have seen many compound archers make the move across or back to Traditional Bows in my time. These



archers should be embraced but also have explained to them the core values of the TAA Club before joining so there is no confusion around our TAA Values and Beliefs.


